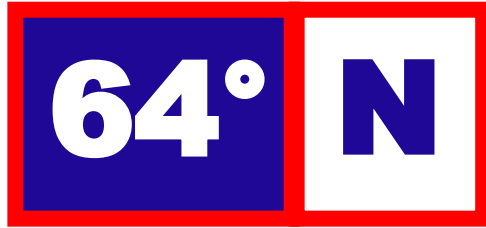

Introduction

On my first visit to this rugged volcanic island, almost thirty years ago, I developed a deep devotion for football in the land of fire and ice. It has been wonderful to witness, first-hand, how football has blossomed since: back then, gravel pitches were still being played on during pre-season tournaments; stadia was nothing more than a few rows of uncovered concrete terracing. The top division was very much part-time football, akin to the Scottish Junior League set-up.

The football infrastructure in Iceland has undergone a massive regeneration, however, the top division clubs have still clung on to a semi-professional tag, even though Icelandic players train five days a week and are paid similar wages to players in the Scottish Championship (second tier) who have full-time status.

There is something unique about the Icelandic game compared to the rest of Europe: four or five clubs have a genuine chance of winning the league each season, which is a breath of fresh air; looking at leagues around the globe, they are entirely dominated by TV money and fat-cat businessmen, with no football background, who have turned clubs into corporate, vanity projects at the expense of life-long supporters who continue to follow family traditions by supporting their local clubs.

This fractured detachment has been more evident during the Covid pandemic, it took a bright green dinosaur, named Gunnersaurus, to bring the dysfunctional into sharp focus when Arsenal relieved the man in the mascot suit from his duties, after 27 years, in a cost-cutting exercise. This, at a time when they were in the process of signing Ghanaian Thomas Partey for £45million on reported wages of £200,000 a week! Arsenal announced 55 redundancies in August, also due to the Covid-19 pandemic, but then signed Brazilian defender Gabriel Magalhaes for £23.14m from Lille - the Premier League outfit are revolving in a different moral stratosphere. Newcastle United, Spurs and Liverpool, clubs who claim to share the principles and values of the working class people, have also shown their true colours during the pandemic with their ravenous appetite for saving cash at the expense of low paid club staff.

Icelandic supporters, players and clubs find themselves at the bottom of the football food chain, existing on the very edge of the game and do so in a vacuum devoid

of attention from the rest of the footballing fraternity. However, there is something magical about watching football in this inhospitable, barren, volcanic outpost. The fans can mingle with the Chairmen and Board members, before or after a match, to discuss any issues that are of concern. It takes you back to an era where clubs in the UK were a beacon of light within communities, the higher echelons of football in the UK have all but lost the understanding of local society. Seeing a whole family heading to the stadium, decked out in their team colours while navigating the narrow Reykjavik streets, takes you back in time to when you first went to a match in the UK - again, money has priced the working class family out of the game. Domestic Icelandic football is not a silky top-class product by any form of means, however, a matchday experience is one that your average UK football fan craves. Football has been excruciatingly dominated by money; it is the smaller leagues that we find football in its purest form.

If I received a pound for every-time I was asked the question “What is the secret to Iceland’s success?” I would be a rich man! The Icelandic mentality is one of the key factors, and given the fact that Iceland have a very well-drilled national team who have played together for the last decade. In Scotland during the 70’s and 80’s we were producing some of the best players in the world; street/school football was being played continuously (even under street lights when it got dark) sometimes 20+ players per team, football was on every street corner or spare piece of land with jumpers for goalposts - that was where you would find raw talent in abundance. Those days seem to have entirely disappeared – does this have a link with how poor our national team have been performing over the past 20 years? Possibly, but there are other deeper attributes as to why we do not produce superstars anymore (that is another story) modern football is evolving at a rapid speed and Scotland simply struggle to keep up with the transformation. In Iceland, kids will be on the enclosed 5-a-side pitches, for hours on end, playing themselves or practising new skills before they go to training sessions with their local clubs.

There is a resoluteness and vibrancy that survives in these tiny, isolated settlements scattered all over this devastatingly beautiful country. Even in the most remote, hindered communities, football is the beating heart!

Beyond the glamour and glitz of the elite football, there are a few fundamentals that preserve the Icelandic game as we know it: Identity – Continuity – Belief.

The glaciated mountain tops lie in grandeur and majesty;
Fjords awash with a fine silvery mist;
Echoes drift across this barren land.
Football awakes from its winter isolation;
The ball is a symbol of civilisation.



Although the Icelandic league competition didn't start until 1912, the origins of football can be traced back to 1895 when the owner of the Isafold Printing company (in Reykjavik) wrote to the Scottish Typographical Association asking for a qualified printer, and demanded that the chosen candidate 'must be a strict temperance man'. The person chosen for the post was Mr James B Ferguson: a skilled printer and keen athlete from Glasgow. On arriving in Reykjavik, James soon became involved in sports, and acquainted local enthusiasts to gymnastics and football. He founded the Reykjavik Gymnastic Club and introduced Icelanders to football activities; he would take youngsters for football practice during his free time from work. Unfortunately, James left Icelandic shores only a year later, in 1896, but left a legacy and lasting impression on the locals. Especially, Bjorn Pálsson Kalman who was particularly passionate about football and made sure that players made great strides to develop, as the embers of football ignited in Iceland. He bought a copy of the English FA rulebook, translated it into Icelandic and read it out to players during the exercises so players were well up to date with the rules of football to ensure they could play legally.

The first football club was founded in 1899, Fotboltafelag Reykjavíkur - now KR. The founding group included quite a few of the boys that Ferguson had coached a few years earlier. At the time, there were no football facilities in Reykjavik. Before training could start, players had to clear stones and debris to form a makeshift pitch at

Grimsstadaholt - close to the Melavöllur site - which became the first football and sports venue in Reykjavik. In 1908, a second club, Fram, was founded and they then went on to create the inaugural football competition in 1912, which KR won. Fram wrote the rules and regulations, provided the trophy, and took pretty much all the income, which led to disputes with rivals KR. The continuing squabbles meant that KR refused to participate in the 1913 and 1914 season: resulting in Fram, as the sole participant, winning the title by default. KR protested to this and wanted to have the competition later in the summer months, so that their players would be up to full fitness, however, Fram wanted to host the competition in the early summer months so that their players would still be in Reykjavik, as many were students and would travel to towns and villages across the country for summer jobs.

It was in 1918 that the "big four" KR, Valur, Fram and Vikingur would lock horns for the first time in league competition. Fram won the silverware for the sixth year in a row. In the early days it was not unusual for fixtures to go unfulfilled and teams awarded a walk-over.

A deal was eventually struck that Fram would continue to run the Icelandic championship as their own property, but KR would form their own competition - The Reykjavik Championship. Later, Valur and Vikingur introduced their own tournaments. It was in 1919/20 that all clubs sat down for talks, finally managed to settle the bickering, and the Icelandic league tournament would be run by the newly formed Reykjavik FA.

There were four competitions held (back then); each team ran their own competition, organised it and kept most of the profits for themselves. Fram "owned" the Icelandic championship; KR had a trophy called Reykjavíkurhornið (The Reykjavik drinking-horn); Valur had a short-lived competition called Íslandshornið (The drinking-horn of Iceland); and Vikingur had Haustmótið (Autumn Tournament). Fram managed to win all four in 1921. Each of these competitions were held like mini tournaments, and for the football fans, each was of similar importance. It is only now, in retrospect, that we see that the Icelandic Championship, back in those days, was a much more important title than the other competitions, which have, since then, been disbanded or turned into meaningless pre-season campaigns.

By now, football was starting to capture the imagination of Icelanders. In 1929, KA and IBV appeared in the league competition after years of inactivity. 1930 was to become one of the most pivotal years in Icelandic football history. KR were the prevalent force in Iceland; underdogs Valur won their first ever title, thus stopping KR in their tracks from gaining a fifth consecutive title. KR, Fram and Valur contin-

ued to dominate Icelandic football until 1950. The Championship trophy had never been won by a club out with the capital area until IA Akranes got their hands on the famous trophy in 1951 (only five years after their formation), knocking the big Reykjavik clubs off their pedestal. The golden age of football had arrived in the small fishing town of Akranes: IA cruised to another five titles during the decade and sealed their reputation as a major force in Icelandic football.

The Icelandic Football Association was founded in 1947 and became a FIFA member the same year. UEFA affiliation began in 1954. In 1957, the National Team played their first ever match at the newly built Laugardalsvollur against their Nordic neighbours, Norway, who beat Iceland 3-0.

Keflavik were the next side to take the trophy out of its usual Reykjavik residence, in 1964, much to the delight of the local townfolk. The Keflavik revival continued into the early seventies: picking up the league title on another three occasions. KR Reykjavik were the first club to represent Iceland when, in 1964, they played in the European Cup against the mighty Liverpool which ended with a comprehensive 11-1 defeat for the KR side. Icelandic clubs struggled in European competition: heavy aggregate defeats were the norm. It was discussed within clubs, at the time, if there was any point in entering the European competitions as continued thrashings was not helping with players morale.

More clubs, from around the country, were joining the national league set-up during the 1960's and 70's. It was not long before three league formats were up and running. Ten teams played in the top tier for the first time in 1977, and it had a dramatic ending: IA and Valur were equal on points going into the last match of the season. IA managed to hold their nerve to secure a 1-0 victory, away to IBV, to secure the league crown; while Valur, who needed a win, were held to a 3-3 draw in the Reykjavik Derby against Vikingur.

The eyes of the world focused on Reykjavik, in 1986, when US President Ronald Reagan and Soviet Leader Mikhail Gorbachev held a summit at the former British consulate Höfði (not far from the National Stadium) to discuss ending the Cold War and the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Missile program. Incidentally, a couple of months prior to the crunch talks, Fram secured the Championship, with a superior goal difference over rivals Valur. The Iceland National team were starting to make a break-through during the qualifiers for Italia 1990; it looked like the days of heavy defeats were a thing of the past. Although they finished bottom of the group, they had made tremendous progress and managed to hold the eventual group winners, USSR, to draws both home and away.

The top tier of Icelandic football was extremely competitive in the ten years leading up to the millennium. A total of 6 different clubs won the championship; including KA Akureyri who won their first-ever domestic trophy. Islanders IBV also won the title two years on the trot. In between all of this, IA Akranes won, a record breaking, 5 Icelandic titles (in succession) from 1992 to 1996 - no other club has matched this record in the modern era.

Dark clouds were looming overhead, for Icelandic football, which would push clubs to the brink of bankruptcy. The Icelandic financial crisis, in 2008, led to an economic depression: long term sponsors (of clubs) scaled back funding; players, coaches and management had to take massive pay cuts due to the enormity of the situation. Breidablik were one of the few clubs that managed to brace itself from the full impact with the transfer fee for Gylfi Sigurdsson's move to Reading and then the subsequent deal to Hoffenheim (sell on clause) helping to control the financial burden. Changes were made to the league format in 2008; the top tier would consist of 12 teams to increase the number of matches played each season to 22. The league system was also expanded, in 2013, to create 4 Deild - which is the fifth tier of Icelandic football.

After the millennium, FH Hafnarfjörður were the leading force of Icelandic football; they secured their first ever title in 2004 and it was no surprise that they then went on to pick up a further 7 titles up until 2016. One of the most exciting seasons, in Icelandic football history, took place on the final day of the 2014 season: it was a two-horse race between FH and Stjarnan. Both teams were unbeaten (the whole season) and it came down to an epic, winner-takes-all, showdown - which lived up to expectations. There was a huge demand for tickets as Icelandic media looked on with anticipation. Over 6,450 crammed into Kópavogur; the away fans were sent into overdrive on 40 minutes when Ólafur Karl Finsen got the goal that Stjarnan so badly wanted; Steven Lennon equalised for FH on 64 minutes to give the home side the title advantage, however, deep into injury time, Stjarnan were awarded a penalty which Finsen calmly slotted home to give his side a 2-1 victory and claim their first ever title, which led to chaotic scenes both on and off the pitch.

Icelandic club stadia did not meet the necessary UEFA criteria, as recently as the early 90's, so all European matches had to be played at the national stadium. Floodlights were only installed at Laugardalsvöllur in 1992 meaning early-afternoon kick-offs were commonplace due to the lack of light, and with many fans still at work, poor attendances were typical for the club's showpiece event of the year. There have been some memorable moments, at European level, over the years; IA beat

Dutch giants Feyenoord 1-0, in the 1993 Champions League qualifier at Laugardalsvollur, courtesy of an Olafur Thordarson bullet header. Valur have beaten French sides Monaco and Nantes, 1-0 and 2-1 respectively. Fram were narrowly beaten 2-1 by Barcelona in 1990; Stoichkov grabbed a late Barca winner with 3 minutes to go. Stjarnan claimed the scalp of Lech Poznan with a 1-0 aggregate victory in the Europa League. Fram claimed a notable 2-1 victory against Rapid Vienna, at a freezing Laugardalsvollur, in the 1985 Cup Winners Cup clash. Breidablik stunned Sturm Graz by beating the Austrian's 1-0, away from home, to progress to the third round of the Europa League in 2013. Only four clubs have won the league and cup double: KR - 1961, 1963, 1999 and 2011; IA - 1983, 1984, 1993 and 1996; Valur won the double in 1976; while IBV lifted both trophies back in 1998.

MELAVOLLUR

The old National Stadium, Melavollur, formally opened by the Sports Association in 1911, was in the South West area of the capital, next to the National Museum. It consisted of a gravel/shale football pitch with a 400m running track around the outside (of the pitch) to fulfil the needs of the locals. There was nothing else in the way of local stadia in the early days in Reykjavik. The Icelandic football league started in 1912 with various teams using the football pitch. KR won the first ever title, then league domination started with Fram going on to win 6 Championships in a row. Almost all top-flight league football was played at Melavollur until 1959.

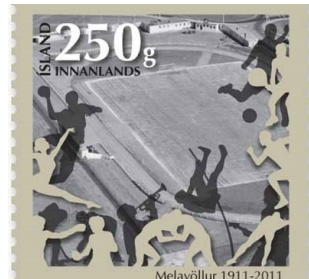
Athletics and football were drawing huge crowds to the ground as Icelandic football grew in stature during the 1940's, capturing the imagination of the locals. During 1926, a violent storm battered the city which ripped away most of the fencing and corrugated structure from the ground. Major re-work was needed to put Melavollur back in place. In July 1946, the stadium had undergone considerable improvements to be able to host a match between Iceland and Denmark. A crowd of 8,000 witnessed a comfortable 3-0 victory for the Danes. In 1947, Queens Park Rangers travelled North for a goodwill tour of Iceland and played against Fram and KR, as well as two other matches against select teams, which attracted huge crowds to come to see what the Icelanders could muster against the far superior QPR. As expected, the English club won easily in all four matches. The first game was against the Reykjavik select side which QPR won 9-0. The second match was against Fram, the Icelandic champions at the time, who went down 6 goals to 1. KR, who had the legendary Albert Gudmundsson in their side, were next up to play the English cracks and ultimately lost 5-0. The final game was a re-match against the Reykjavik select team which the Englishmen routed their counterparts 6-1. All four games were played in the space of 9 days. I would like to hear what the modern footballer would have to say about playing that many games in such a short period of time. These matches proved as a catalyst for the coaches, and footballers of the Reykjavik teams, as they saw first-hand how fit and strong the Englishmen were and new training regimes were put into place. The romance of Melavollur continued to tug at the heartstrings of the locals. In winter, the ground was transformed into an ice rink for families to enjoy. Melavollur was held in such high regard, by Icelanders themselves, that the ground even had a stamp commissioned after it! However, Melavollur's days were in jeopardy when Iceland decided to enter the qualifiers for the 1958 World Cup. It had

a small covered stand, with bench seating for 500, on the Western side of the stadium to protect spectators against the harsh arctic elements, the rest of the ground was standing terracing with no cover. Iceland needed a proper stadium with a grass pitch to host the qualifier games, so, Laugardalsvöllur was built in the East of Reykjavík. Laugardalsvöllur was officially opened on July 8, 1957, as Iceland played host to Norway. Melavöllur was still used by local teams in the Greater Reykjavík area and the Icelandic cup finals were still being held at the ground, which was now showing its age, eventually, the ground had floodlights erected in 1971 which lit up this small part of Western Reykjavík during the dark winter nights.

Quite a few unofficial internationals were held at the ground but FIFA and UEFA failed to recognise these matches due to the gravel surface (which the teams played on) but to Iceland it was all part of the process of playing bigger countries and trying to gain more experience against the stronger nations. The ground also became a social, focal point for the Icelanders to catch up on the latest news and gossip while watching the athletics or football that was on offer. The smell of freshly cooked hotdogs would linger in the air from the solitary food stand inside the stadium. Helgi Thorvaldsson reminisces “The hotdogs were the best in town, even if you had a big dinner before going to watch a match, spectators would always have enough room for a hotdog. There were also vendors who would walk around the ground selling popcorn and chocolate from canvas shoulder bags, young kids would be on hand to re-supply the vendors who would do a brisk trade during big events. The kids were paid for their peggy work with liquorice and chocolate after the football matches.”

The Icelandic cup finals were held at Melavöllur from 1960-1972, with the powerhouse at the time KR winning 7 finals during those years. One of the most incredible cup finals of that era took place in 1965 when Valur played against IA Akranes. A thrilling match watched by a large crowd, Valur defeated IA by 5 goals to 3. The 1972 final was the last held at Melavöllur with IBV beating FH 2-0: a brace scored by Haraldur Juliusson. By the mid 1970's Melavöllur was falling into disrepair and costing huge sums of money to keep afloat; most clubs in the capital and Greater Reykjavík area had bought plots of land in different neighbourhoods across the city to build their own facilities and infrastructure as Reykjavík started to expand due to population growth. The curtain finally came down on the old, ramshackle, stadium when the floodlights were cut down and moved to Throttur Reykjavík's ground in Laugardalur - where they remain in use to this day. Much of the timber and corrugated iron was recycled and put to good use. The wooden fence that ran round the perimeter of the stadium ended up being shipped out to the Eastern town of

Vopnafjörður to be used as a roof on a mink shed. Some of the corrugated iron was used as spare parts for housing in the Reykjavík area. The final match at the ground was between KR and KA with the Akureyri side winning 1-0; Helgi Eiríksson had the honour of scoring the last goal at the stadium. The shouting, singing and excitement, that used to reverberate around this area of Reykjavík, fell silent in the winter of 1984 as Melavöllur formally closed. The last of the stadium structures were removed the following year. All that remains today is a street post, with a brief history of Melavöllur, adjacent to the University of Iceland. Reykjavík City Council preserved a section of the corrugated fence - hopefully they will turn it into a more fitting monument to a historic stadium that was an integral part of the Icelandic football heritage.

Hörður Magnússon



Three-time Golden Boot winner, Hordur Magnusson speaks candidly about the highs and lows of his football career.

Many players in the Icelandic Premier division are paid a decent wage these days and do not have to worry too much about the financial implications of combining a full-time job with football commitments. Back in the 1980's it was a completely different story as Icelandic football was very much a part-time sport. Hordur reminisces about playing for his hometown club FH Hafnarfjordur. "We were not paid much money for playing football back in the day, I held down a full-time job in sales and marketing, however, I had a very understanding employer who knew about my football situation with FH, he would let me finish work early in order for me to prepare for a match. I would also accumulate my yearly holidays and take them in the month that FH had most fixtures, usually in the summer months. It wasn't always plain sailing as sometimes there was no cover, I would work until 4pm then head straight to the stadium for a match at 7pm, which wasn't ideal, but it became second nature to me."

Hordur won 9 caps for the National Team, which was a great achievement considering he was playing in the Icelandic domestic league and competing for a place in the national squad alongside more accomplished players who were earning a living playing for clubs abroad. In a career spanning 19 years, the goal-scoring predator bagged an astonishing 240 senior goals in 400 appearances. Asked what was his most memorable goal(s) Hordur scratches his head. "That's a difficult one – My International goal away to Hungary in Budapest during a World Cup Qualifier springs to mind, we were losing 1-0, Toddi Orlygsson equalised in the second half, I came on as a substitute and scored the winner from close range to help Iceland to a rare away victory. FH played a UEFA Cup tie against Dundee United in 1990, who, at the time, were competing well against the Old Firm; they had 4 or 5 Scottish international players and a good European pedigree - we lost the first leg at home 3-1. In the return leg at Tannadice, I scored to give us a 1-0 lead, then on 28 minutes Kristjan Gislason scored to double our lead, we also missed a sitter just before half-time - we had Dundee on the backfoot. United showed their class in the second half to grab 2 late goals. The match finished 2-2 and we lost 5-3 on aggregate, however, I was extremely proud of the team's performance over both legs."

When asked about any infamous dressing room bust-ups or hairdryer treatment, Hoddi smiles "Oh yes, there were plenty of incidents. I was subbed during a cup match early in my career, I wasn't very happy about it, when I was going up the tunnel I lashed out and kicked a door so hard that pieces of my studs were embedded in the door, I was lucky that I didn't break my foot or suffer serious injury, the

broken fragments of stud were still impaled in the door until it got replaced a few years later. I received a 1 match ban from our manager for all my troubles.”

These days, a huge number of Icelanders are signing for foreign clubs all over Europe, top scorers in the Icelandic Pepsi Max Division are highly sought after, mainly from other Nordic countries as they try to attract the latest Icelandic prospects at a fraction of the going market price. I asked Hoddi if he had any regrets about not playing abroad. “Without a doubt yes, but I don’t dwell or get hung up about the fact. I went on trial for two weeks to Sheffield United; I played well in the two reserve matches, Sheffield had a strong squad at the time, it was a fantastic experience to train alongside Brian Deane and Vinnie Jones. Dave Bassett was the manager; he was very honest and told me I was not better than any of the other forwards in the squad. Sheffield had a connection with a club in Sweden, he spoke about putting me out on loan to the Swedish club then he would re-evaluate the situation after a period of time, but I decided to return back to Iceland instead. I also had trials in Norway but back then it was so difficult to move abroad as so many factors were involved. There were numerous rules on player quotas to certain countries, and with no such thing as agents, everything was done off your own back, so I often had to contend with a lot of red tape. The Icelandic season finished in September and the trials took place over the winter months, so I was not always in peak condition. I started to become unsure of myself and sometimes cast doubts about my ability. Spanish 2nd Division side Merida AD came in for me and it looked like the deal was a formality, everything was in place, ready to go, however, at the last hour the deal fell through, it appeared that FH had increased my transfer price and the Spanish club were refusing to pay the higher fee. But that is life, you just need to hold your head high and carry on despite the obvious disappointment.”

It was at this point during the video interview that things took a bizarre turn: Hoddi’s eyes widened, an alarmed expression started to etch across his face, after what seemed like an eternity, he stared back at me “We have just had an earthquake.” The epicentre of the major earthquake was only 30 miles away from his house, the quake measured 5.6 on the Richter scale. Hoddi showed true professionalism by calmly continuing our conversation.

We touched on the Pepsi Division and agreed that it needs a revamp as the two promoted 1 Deild clubs struggle to compete at a higher standard and usually get relegated in their first season; this has been prominent once again as Fjolnir and Grotta remain way-behind the rest of the pack. “I would like to see the KSI completely overhaul the competition; something similar to the Scottish or Danish league concept so there are more top flight games or play-off matches in every division, so mid table teams have something to play for, it would also encourage the development of

our younger players. Fans would love to see the likes of Breidablik, FH, Valur and KR playing each other 3 or 4 times per season. I would also like to see the Icelandic Cup modified - starting in March, with the last 32 played in group sections, then the top two of each group compete in a knock-out format, with the final taking place in May for the European spot. There are many tweaks, in all competitions, that need to be addressed to increase the number of matches and enhance the image of Icelandic football.” After Hoddur hung up his boots, he continued his love affair with football, and established a new career working in media for Icelandic TV company Stod2, where he went on to become the charismatic host of PepsiMorkin (Iceland’s version of Match of the Day) for almost 20 years. “We didn’t have a huge budget to run the show, however, the small production team and pundits excelled themselves to make the content as appealing as possible for the viewers.”

Hoddur has an infectious persona and a voracious appetite for football, he is currently working as a commentator for the Nordic online, video streaming service Viaplay who offer all the latest live international football from countries around the globe. “It’s an interesting job which has broadened my perceptions as I’m covering matches in various European countries; it’s invigorating to witness different styles of play from Germany to Sweden. There is a huge gulf, in class, from the top Pepsi clubs to some of the lesser known Premier clubs in Scotland and Denmark.”

Achievements include: Hafnarfjordur Sportsman of the Year award in 1991; top scorer at FH 9 years in a row, overall, 12 times out of the 18 years he spent at the club which is a remarkable achievement; Player of the Year award 4 times and Athlete of the year twice during a glittering career at FH.

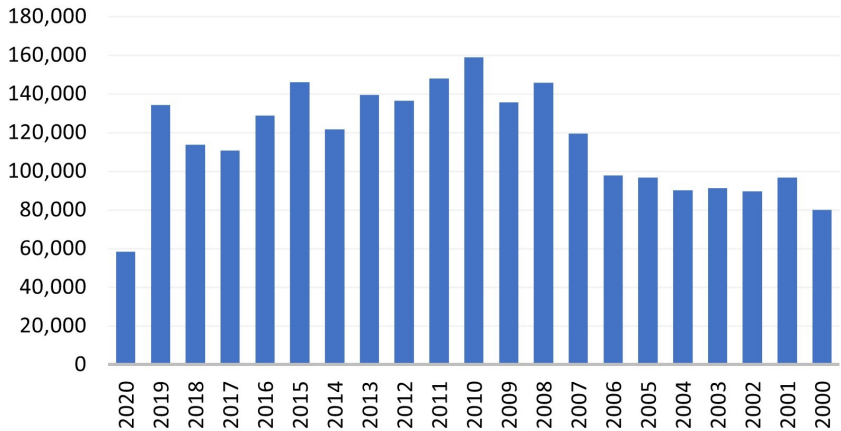

Rúnar Kristinsson

Runar Kristinsson is Iceland's most decorated National player, making 104 appearances for his country. He recently extended his contract as Manager of KR Reykjavik until 2023.

The Covid pandemic has caused so many problems to football clubs around the world in 2020. Runar talks about the issues he and his club have had to face, "The financial aspects are going to have a huge impact for years to come, we have lost a lot of revenue with the ground being closed to fans. For instance, home matches against Valur and FH would normally attract something in the region of 2,500 fans, even for a small club of our size, we need weekly income over the summer to pay wages and overheads, but all Icelandic clubs are in the same boat. We will have to rely on youth players in upcoming years and put more emphasis into building a stronger youth set up. We've had some problems with our youth development but we will address the issues, KR don't want to start taking players from other clubs, we want to rely on getting the best players from our own catchment area. There are also 4 to 5 first team players whose contracts are up, but I hope to renegotiate with them to continue next season."

I asked if KR would look at foreign players? "I'm currently looking at the Icelandic market, as this would be the cheaper option for us, but I wouldn't rule out bringing foreign players in. It can be difficult sometimes trying to persuade players to come to Iceland, some think it's a step down, but there are other factors we need to take into account: flights, accommodation and cars, we have to weigh up the extra costs and risks. We need more contacts abroad as we do not have a scouting system in place for getting full background reports and player history when we are looking at potential players. The Icelandic Premier League can be a good stepping-stone for professional players to get game time under their belt. We had a player from SK Brann Bergen on loan, he worked hard at KR, got to know a different system of football, and played a couple of matches in the Champions League Qualifiers for us: it revitalised the lad and gave him a lot more self-confidence, he returned back to Norway and shortly afterwards was made the club captain."

The disappointing European results, for Icelandic clubs, have been a major cause of concern in recent years. Iceland have been dropping down the UEFA coefficient table at an alarming rate, and as things presently stand, Icelandic clubs could be reduced by four to three teams if the trend continues. Clubs from smaller countries are on the crest of a wave: Dundalk from Ireland made the group phase of the Europa League securing a £2.7M windfall; KI Klaksvik, from the Faroes, reached the play-off stage in Europe and netted £1.2 million in the process, which will keep them financially secure for the next 3 years. Where has it all gone wrong in Iceland?

Runar explains, “Things have been tough for Icelandic clubs in Europe, we are playing against full-time professional players. Looking back at our CL match against Celtic, they were a different class to us, we were too slow moving the ball into midfield areas. The high-speed tempo of European matches is something that needs to be improved in Iceland. I have my players for training sessions at 5pm, but the likes of Celtic, they can work with players from 9am to 5pm, if they wish to do to. Yes, we need to be more adaptive to the European style of football, it’s vitally important we don’t go down to three representatives in European competitions.”

KR is the most successful Icelandic club, a real football institution tucked away in the oldest suburb of Reykjavik. KR has been in most part of Runar’s life, he is so passionate about the club that he grew up with, it runs through his veins. I put a point across to him if he would ever consider a managerial positional with another Icelandic club, he takes a deep breath, “I’m a KR man through and through, it’s in my blood, I’ve been a Player, Sports Director and Manager here, but I’m not naïve enough to think I will be part of KR forever, if results go against me, I could easily get sacked, that is football. Much would also depend on whether I wanted to continue with management further down the line. You just need to look at the experience that both Oli Jo and Logi Olafsson have gained, managing top clubs in Iceland.”

Many of Iceland’s top youth prospects have signed contracts for professional clubs around Europe over the past decade. In the past few seasons, there has been an influx of players returning to Iceland, to play in the Pepsi-Deild, as they struggle to break-through into first team football abroad. I asked Runar if this is a concerning trend? “I think far too many players are going abroad at a young age, but I don’t blame them, they do, however, need more guidance when they are making very important career decisions, It is very difficult for them to compete for squad places, at foreign football academies, with another 30 - 40 players. In my opinion, our best talent should stay in Iceland for a couple of extra seasons and gain more experience playing at the top level, it would make the transition easier for them when they go abroad. Many of the guys who have returned home are quality players, ideal for the Icelandic Premier league, but some come back broken. When players go abroad, we need to give them more support as it is a complete life changing experience, they need to be able to adapt to different cultures and tougher training regimes very quickly.”

I asked Runar about his most memorable matches, playing in the blue jersey of Iceland, “Without a doubt, when we played against France, home and away in 1998 and 1999, in the Euro 2000 qualifiers. France had just been crowned World Champions, a few months prior to arriving at Laugardalsvollur, so they had huge expect-

tations. It was a momentous game for us playing against the likes of Zidane, Deschamps, Pires and Henry. The Icelandic FA had to add extra tribunes behind each goal as there was such a massive demand for tickets, the stadium was packed out. Rikhardur Dadason gave us a shock lead, the French equalised a short time later, we put in a battling performance in all areas of the pitch to keep the French at bay and secure a 1-1 draw.”

The return leg, at the Stade de France, was a baptism of fire for the Icelanders playing the French in their own backyard, in front of 78,391 loud, passionate Parisiens. “We lost the match 3-2, David Trezeguet scored the winning goal with 20 minutes remaining, we gave as good as we got and were unlucky not to come away from Paris with a share of the spoils. I was extremely proud of how we played in both matches against a team that had so many world class players.”

The curtain came down on Runar’s distinguished international career in 2004. In his very last match, the midfield maestro put the icing on the cake as he helped his side to a shock 2-0 win over Italy in Reykjavik. Runar never got the chance to play at a major international tournament. I asked what he would have given to play at a major event, Runar laughs inwardly... “My family and I travelled over to France for the Portugal v Iceland match at the Euros. I was just like any other of the 10,000 Icelanders packed into the stadium, singing and clapping, soaking up the atmosphere, to be honest I was shocked by the enormity and scale of support cheering Iceland on. It was a pleasure to witness something so historical and be amongst the supporters that gave the world the ‘HUH’, yes, it would have been an amazing experience to be on the pitch, playing in such a match against Ronaldo and Nani. I can only imagine what it was like for the Iceland players playing on the global stage.”

Runar started his football career, in 1986, playing for his neighbourhood club KR. It was not long before foreign scouts were tracking Runar, due to his dazzling displays for both KR and the National Team. Runar signed for Swedish outfit Örgryte in 1994, then went on to play for Norwegian side Lillestrom, where he made 71 appearances, scoring 14 goals. His precocious skills soon caught the attention of Belgian side Lokeren, who had a good European pedigree at the time. He spent 7 successful years with the Belgian side, making 189 appearances and bagging a healthy 37 goals to his name. Having dabbled with spells in management, at Lillestrom and Lokeren, Runar returned home to Iceland and steered the Vesturbaer based club to Championship title wins in 2011, 2013 and 2019, and Icelandic Cup glory in 2011, 2012 and 2014. As a player he was awarded Young Player of the Year in 1987 and won the Icelandic Cup with KR in 1994.

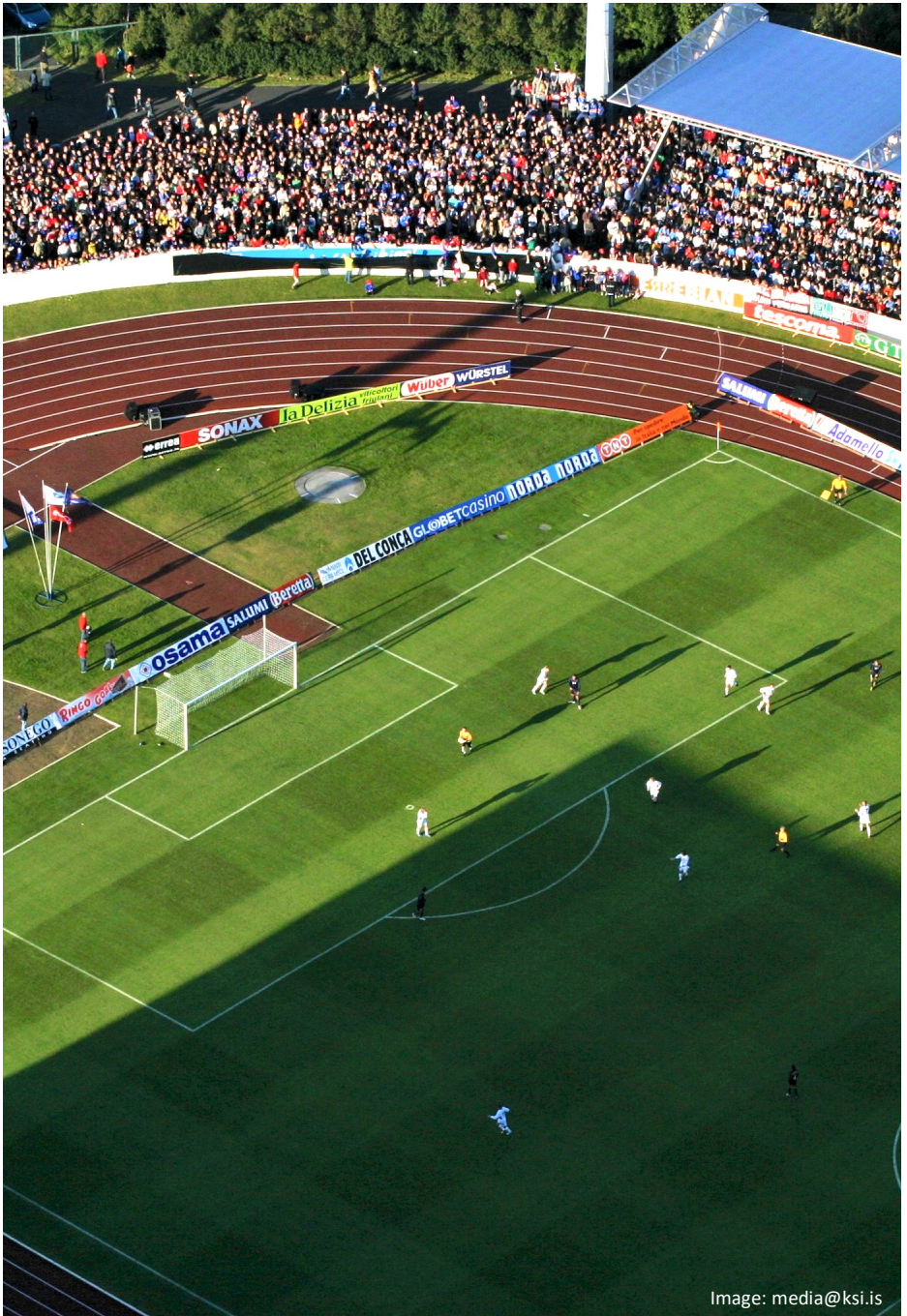

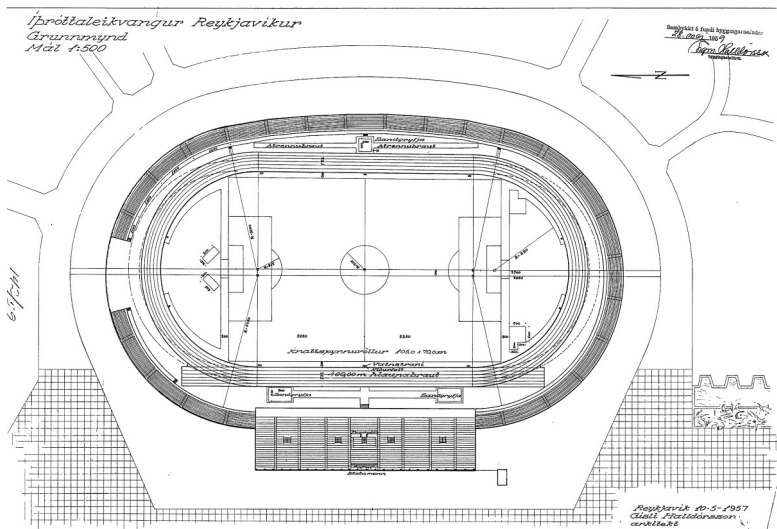


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LAUGARDALSVOLLUR

Laugardalur valley was chosen as the location for the National Stadium back in the 1950's. The ground was opened on July 8, 1957 as Iceland entertained their Nordic counterparts Norway - who comfortably beat their hosts 3-0. The first domestic league match, between Fram and IA, took place a month later. In the early days, Laugardalsvollur was basic, to say the least, in essence it was a low rise, oval shaped bowl with open terracing and one seated stand. President Asgeir Asgeirsson officially ordained the ground in 1959. Between 1965-1970, major work took place: extending the main stand on the western side of the stadium with bench seating the preferred option. By 1970 the construction of the new west stand was finished, complete with a roof to give fans rest bite from the driving rain and Arctic winds that this part of the world is accustomed too. The Icelandic cup final was played at the national stadium for the first time in 1973, when Fram made history beating Keflavik 2-1 in front of a sizeable crowd. The stadium did not change much for the next two decades as there was no money available to improve the infrastructure. In 1992 a new 8 lane, 400m, running track was laid on the outside of the pitch. The floodlights, with a 1,600 Max Lux, were switched on for the first time as Iceland entertained Greece. Laugardalsvollur was falling way behind UEFA criteria – the narrow open terracing was starting to crack and become unstable, the concrete scoreboard looked like a brutalist relic from the Soviet era. In 1997 the new east stand was built, complete with a roof and seating for 3,500, although it must be said that the stand is basic: there is no facilities within it. On match days, portaloos must be brought in, and makeshift food stalls are erected behind the stand. The main western-side stand was modernised in 2005: a new roof and 6,300 seats were installed, as well as a lavish media press box. The KSI moved their offices into the main stand once the work was completed. The ground currently has a capacity of 9,800, however, the highest attendance for a match was 20,204 when Iceland took on Italy on August 18, 2004; around 30,000 attended an Ed Sheeran concert August 10, 2019.

Presently, Laugardalsvollur is not fit for purpose as a national stadium - falling way behind European standards. The KSI have to receive a UEFA exemptions to host matches, and after years of debate, the Icelandic Government has finally agreed to begin negotiations with the City of Reykjavik on the next steps regarding the construction of a new national stadium, which will have a capacity of 15,000. Completion of the new stadium is expected within the next 5 years.

The league was suspended by the KSI due to the Covid pandemic. As a result, Breidablik won the title, whilst KR and FH were relegated. *Average points per game was used to determine final league positions.



LOST GROUNDS

Skeidsvollur, located in the frontier town of Bolungarvik, is used mostly, these days, as a training pitch, although, 4th division side Hordur occasionally use the ground. One of its charming features are the seats which are nailed to a wooden log. KS no longer use the ground at Siglufjordur, which is surrounded by steep glaciated mountains; they amalgamated with Leiftur and now play under the guise of KF, home matches are played in the nearby town of Olafsfjordur. UMF Grundarfjordur ceased playing league football, the ground, which sits at the bottom of the towering Snaefellsjokull glacier, now hosts youth training matches. Neisti Hofsos are no longer in business, the pitch is, once again, a playground for the youngsters in the village to have a kick-about or training session. (Iceland's most famous film Director, Baltasar Kormakur, played with Neisti.) Throttur Neskaupstadur, based in the East of the country, played at Nordfjardarvollur until they amalgamated with Valur Reydarfjordur, Austri and Sulan to form Fjardabyggd - who are now based in Eskifjordur. Their old pitch is occasionally still in use if the pitch in Eskifjordur is unplayable at the start of the season. Sulan's original pitch, in the village of Stodvarfjordur, is perched precariously on a cliff next to the sea; a few balls must have met a watery end at that desolate, windswept ground.

REYKJAVIK GUIDE

Reykjavik is the world's most northernmost capital with a population of 123,000 and is now a popular tourist destination. The city was founded in 1786 as an official trading town as well as a commercial shipping route. The steam from the thermal hot springs are said to have inspired Reykjavik's name, which loosely translates in English as Smokey Bay. The Harpa concert hall is one of the more modern architectural features in the downtown area. Construction started in 2007 but the banking crisis halted the progress of this magnificent structure, and it was finally completed in 2011 at cost of £142 million. A short walk from the concert hall is the old fishing harbour, Grandi, which has undergone a massive regeneration over recent years, and there are many award-winning restaurants, pubs and shops. You can also book whale watching tours from the many vendors that operate around the pier. Overlooking the city is the unmistakable Hallgrimskirkja church which has panoramic views across Greater Reykjavik and Mount Esja which always seems to have a peppering of snow even in the summer months.

Icelanders are well known for their quirky sense of humour and one of the main attractions is the Iceland Phallogical Museum, which holds the world's largest display of penises, see how you measure up to a Killer whale! The nightlife is very lively in Reykjavik, especially over the weekends, with over 100 bars/clubs to choose from. You will be out having a coffee at a bistro during the day and by night the place will take on a different look as music blasts from the speakers and the coffee machines are replaced by bottles of Gull beer. Kaffibarinn is one of the most famous bars in Reykjavik with live music played on most nights, Damon Alburn from Blur is rumoured to be a part owner of this hip pub. Bjarni Fel Sportsbar on Austurstraeti has a selection of football memorabilia from KR Reykjavik on the walls.

You won't find many locals going out until 11pm as most will stay home and drink beforehand. I would advise doing this too as the beer and spirit prices will bring a tear to a glass eye! Beer was banned in Iceland as recently as 1989 so you will witness the locals making up for lost time. You can also purchase duty free alcohol coming into the country at Keflavik airport so make sure you buy your allowance. Food can be expensive in Reykjavik, the food stalls Hlólábatar and Pylsuhúsid on Hafnarstraeti are good value for money, also look

out for deals during the day at takeaways. If you're self-catering, buy food from the Bonus supermarkets. There are many outdoor geothermal swimming pools and hot pots scattered around the city with the largest pool directly across from the National stadium at Laugardalslaug, the invigorating hot pots should help clear away any hangovers from the night before. There is even a geothermal beach at Nautholsvik, which is a 10 minute walk from Hlidarendi, the home ground of Valur Reykjavik. The famous waterfalls and geysers are only 90 minutes away from the capital so it's easy to go exploring during the day, and be back in the city for dinner, then head to a match in the evening.

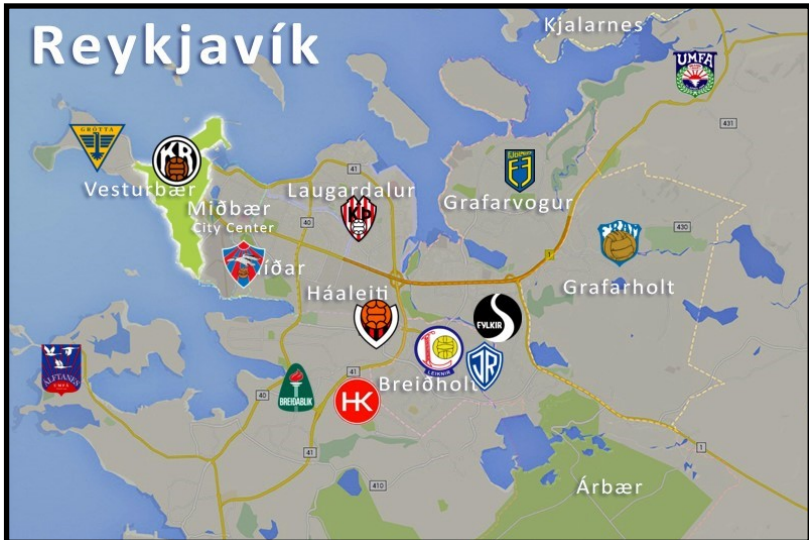

Getting around the city

Travelling around the city is very easy on foot or bus, Reykjavik is not a particularly big city but you will need transport if you are visiting the grounds in the east of the city or going to matches in the Greater Reykjavik suburbs. There aren't many traffic problems in the city but give yourself an extra 20-30 minutes if you are travelling during rush hour. Straeto is the main bus service around in Reykjavik and they provide a good service around the city and beyond. A single bus ticket will cost around £3.50. You can also purchase an unlimited single day ticket £12 and a 3 day ticket will cost approximately £28.

Bike hire is widely available. Reykjavik bike tours on Aegisgardur 7 will be happy to help you out, the price for 24 hour hire is around £36.

Taxis – Hreyfil (+354 588 5522) There are a few taxi ranks in the downtown area of the city.

Car hire is widely available. Contact Sadcars on Skogarhlid 10 to check for availability and what type of car you require. Sadcars.com

Mjodd Bus Station – On the East side of the city. This station operates the long distance services to the main towns around Iceland.

Reykjavik Airport is close to the city centre, a taxi will set you back £10-15. Reykjavik airport connects to Akureyri, Isafjordur, Egilsstadir and Vestmannaeyjar. www.airiceland

Keflavik Airport is a modern airport with good connections to the capital, the Flybus shuttle service which is run by Reykjavik Excursions will take 45 minutes to get you to Reykjavik. Book tickets at www.re.is the tickets cost approximately £16.50 one way and will drop you at the BSI terminal. There is no rail network in Iceland, but it's very easy to navigate the country using the public transport system.

Ferry Service

The ferry service to connect from Landeyjahofn on the mainland to Vestmannaeyjar, they journey is about 35 minutes and is approximately £25 return. Book online as the service is extremely busy during July/August. Eimskip.is



KR was established on 16 February 1899, making it the oldest football club in Iceland. It was founded as Fotboltafélag Reykjavíkur (Reykjavík Football Club) before changing to Knattspyrnufélag Reykjavíkur (KR). In 1912, they won the inaugural championship after a play-off with Fram.

The photo below is of KR parading, in their famous black and white shirts, at Sudurgata (Near Lake Tjornin) making their way to Melavollur stadium at the start of the 1929 championship. They thrashed rivals Fram 7-1 in the opening game of the campaign. KR were the dominant force from 1926 to 1932, winning 6 titles during those years. In 1930, a 2-1 defeat to Valur was enough to give Valsmenn their first championship crown and stopped KR in their tracks from securing a potential record breaking 7 titles on the trot. KR-ingar, as they are affectionately known to their fans, are the most successful club in the country; a football establishment from the contiguous urban area of Vesturbaer.





IBV played host to KR at the volcanic, black ash pitch, Marlavollur, on the island of Heimaey, in 1968. The smoke, you can see in the background, is from one of the many fish processing plants adjacent to the harbour. Many injuries were sustained from the brutal surface which would require dettol and a scrubbing brush to clean the cuts. Tragedy hit the island just 5 years after this photo was taken as the Eldfell volcano erupted in 1973 which destroyed many houses and forced the evacuation of the entire population. The Vestmannaeyjar archipelago is made up of 15 islands which lie in the Southern Icelandic volcanic system and consists of 70-80 volcanoes both above and below sea level. IBV currently play their matches at the picturesque Hasteinsvollur which is a stone throw away from Marlavollur.



Mighty Benfica came rolling into town in 1968, to play Valur in the first round of the European cup. The mouth-watering tie caught the imagination of the locals, who turned out in force at Laugardalsvöllur, a record crowd of 18,243 squeezed into the national stadium to witness the skills of the legendary Eusebio, Coluna and Jose Torres. After the Benfica's workout the day before the match, Eusebio invited journalists to the hotel where the team stayed and chatted with them. The Icelandic media didn't give Valur any chance of taking anything from the match; "Mission Impossible" was the headline on the sport page. Valur kicked-off the match but it became apparently clear that it was going to be a 'David and Goliath' battle. During the opening seven minutes, Benfica had three good chances, Valur played for long spells of the match with a 7-man defence as Benfica lay siege on the Valur goal. Goalkeeper Sigurdur Dagsson was performing heroics between the sticks. Valur eventually held on to grab a historical 0-0 draw against the Portuguese giants. The statistics were remarkable; Benfica had 47 shots on goal, including 24 on target, but no goals. Paul Ragnarsson, a dentist in Saudarkrokur, had the role of man-marking Eusebio - who won the prestigious Ballon D'Or in 1965. Eusebio paid tribute to Paul after the match, "He played well and didn't let me out of his sight, he deserves credit for taking good care of me." Icelandic clubs in the early days of European competition slumped to double digit aggregate defeats on a regular basis. Morgunbladid, Iceland's national newspaper, ran with the headline the following day after the match "The Miracle" Valur – Benfica 0:0. The clubs locked horns again two weeks later at Estadio da Luz where Valur lost 8-1. Hit-man Jose Torres bagged a hat-trick in the rout, Hermann Gunnarsson scored the consolation goal for Valur. Despite the heavy defeat, the Reykjavik side gained a few new admirers following their 1st leg shock score-line.



There are not that many amateur clubs who can gain a huge cult following around the world but be literally unheard of in their own country! FC Eyjafjallajökull became an Internet sensation in 2020 when the club logo was included in an online, World Cup, football badge competition. It was no surprise that their fantastic badge, which depicts the famous volcano that erupted in 2010 causing enormous disruption to air travel, gained support from football aficionados across the planet. The amateur outfit, who usually play in the Pollamot and Boreal tournaments, have earned new subscribers to their social media accounts from as far afield as South America. Eurosport Russia even lined up an interview with their team manager, Konrad Oskarsson, to learn more about the club. FC Eyjafjallajökull unveiled a new club shirt in 2020, which prompted football fans to snap up the shirt featuring the (now famous) volcano badge. Shirts went out to 7 countries across the world; UK, Ukraine, Belgium, Holland, USA, Russia and Spain, they even got an enquiry from Australia. It is hard to ponder that this amateur club have sold more shirts abroad than any other domestic Icelandic team. The ambitious club have set the bar high and hope to travel abroad in 2021 for a few matches against foreign opposition.

FC EYJAFJALLAJÖKULL





Manchester United visited the shores of Akureyri in 1982, for a glamour friendly, which was set up by Sharp Electronics who were the sponsors of both clubs at the time. Man United ran out easy 7-1 winners in front of a bumper 4,400 crowd. Eyjolf Agustsson scored the solitary goal for the home side which went down in local folklore. George Best played part of the match for KA which thrilled the spectators. Feyenoord travelled Akureyri in 1978 in a match that was part of a transfer deal. An astonishing crowd of 4,000 (nearly half of the town's population at the time) came to Akureyrarvöllur to witness KA play against the Dutch maestros. Feyenoord showed their class and ran out comfortable 4-0 winners.





Akranesvollur has witnessed many memorable matches and drama over the years. None more so than the 1996 league campaign. The Akranes club were involved in a mammoth battle with old foes, KR, for the Icelandic championship, which went down to the final game of the season. IA only needed a draw, to retain the title for the fifth year on the bounce, as they had a superior goal difference over their rivals KR. A record crowd of 5,801 crammed into the ground, which was remarkable given that the population of Akranes was around 5,500 at the time. Olafur Adolphsson gave the hosts a slender lead just before half-time. Haraldur Ingolfsson knocked the ball home, on 65 minutes, to give the hosts a two-goal cushion, however, Rikhardur Dadason threw KR a lifeline, just 6 minutes later, as he crashed the ball into the Akranes net to set up a tense finale. KR pushed more men forward, trying to seek the 2 goals they desperately needed to revive their championship hopes, the Reykjavik side went on all-out attack to find the elusive goals. However, they were leaving spaces in defence as they mounted pressure on the IA rear-guard. Bjarni Gudjonsson scored 2 clinical quick-fire goals, for Akranes, in the final ten minutes of an absorbing match to give IA a 4-1 victory and send the home fans into raptures as they secured a memorable 17th Icelandic league title.



A ndrzej Streljau coached Fram in 1982 and 1983. Even though the team were relegated in his first season (only to bounce back up the next year as 1 Deild champions) he is generally considered to have laid the foundations for the successful Fram team of the mid to late 80s. Streljau, who later went on to become the national manager of Poland, was one of several football coaches from Eastern Europe that worked in Iceland in the late 1970s and early 1980s. They were sent over to Iceland by the FAs of the Eastern bloc countries, partly as a goodwill gesture/political propaganda. Their wages were usually not paid to them directly but transferred to the authorities in their home country who then paid them their standard salary. Fram organised for Streljau to run, on the side, a football program for kids, thus giving him the chance to earn extra money that went straight into his own pocket.



Over the years there has been a strong Scottish influence on Icelandic football. James McCrae, ex- Clyde, West Ham and Bury player, had a successful spell managing Fram from 1946-1948; he led the Reykjavik club to 2 consecutive titles. The Icelandic national team have had four Scottish managers at the helm. In 1946, Murdo McDougall was jointly in charge with Englishman Freddie Steele for Iceland's first ever international match. Glasgow born, Rev. Robert Jack spent most of his life in Iceland; Valur won 2 titles during his tenure at the club before he moved to the East of Iceland where he helped the local club, based at Stodvarfjordur, become regional champions. Legendary Rangers and Aberdeen player Alex Willoughby took charge of the KA Akureyri hotseat between 1980-82, during his first season in charge of the Northern club he won them promotion to the top tier. The late Ian Ross, who made 175 appearances for Aston Villa, steered Valur to title glory in 1985 and 1987 before embarking on spells with KR and Keflavik. Ex-St Mirren defender David Winnie became the first foreigner to win the coveted Icelandic Player of the Year award with KR in 1998. Many more Scotsmen have managed or played with Icelandic clubs over the years including David Moyes who played for IBV.

Throttur Reykjavik Old Boys are at the forefront of revolutionising the amateur game in Iceland. They have the largest membership of players (around 150 active members) who become legit to join the exclusive group once they are over 30 years old. In recent years, Throttur have taken on the mantle as a touring club after visits to Scotland and the North of England to play matches against foreign opposition. A forty-strong party touched down in Edinburgh, in 2019, for a gruelling four match tour, playing at venues such as Broadwood Stadium, Falkirk Stadium, and Sunderland's Stadium of Light. The club have cemented strong ties and friendships in the UK over the past few years. Over 35's teams from all over Scotland are now lining up to play their Icelandic counterparts in friendly matches. The 2020 tour, which included games in Aberdeen, Edinburgh and Sunderland, fell foul to the Covid pandemic, although plans are already in the pipeline for 2021 provided Throttur Old Boys are permitted to travel by governing bodies. Throttur have teams in the 30+, 40-50 and 50+ Categories which is run under the auspice of the KSI. The commitment and ambition that both the Throttur players and committee have shown to organise such tours is remarkable as the club continues to up the ante. The Old Boys main aim is to keep fit, but there is also a social aspect which flourishes on and off the pitch; the tours abroad heightens the camaraderie within the group; huge strides have been taken to improve the dynamics within the club and community. Sports giants Mizuno recently travelled to Iceland for the documentary 'Reach Beyond'. Elder Statesman, Magnus Dan, at the grand age of 70, was the focus of the short film. The club is gaining new admirers as they go from strength-to-strength at home and abroad.





In 1978, Einherji played the biggest match of the club's history after impressing in the early rounds of the Iceland Cup, taking the scalps of Hottur, Leiknir F, Austri and Vikingur Olafsvik, the minnows were rewarded for their efforts and drawn at home in the Quarter-final to reigning Icelandic champions IA. This is what the romance of the cup is all about: IA Akranes, the powerhouse of Icelandic football, who had famous players such as Petur Petursson and Karl Thordarson making the 14 hour round trip from the Western peninsula to the rural outpost of Vopnafjordur (population 550). The match caught the attention of the locals as well as the neighbouring hamlets and villages; an estimated crowd of around 500 congregated at Vopnafjardarvöllur to show their support for Einherji. The locals put up a valiant fight but succumb to a heavy 6-1 defeat: Petur Petursson and Matthias Hallgrímsson both bagged hat-tricks for the illustrious visitors; Vigfus Davidsson scored the consolation goal for the hosts. IA then went on to lift the Icelandic cup by beating Valur 1-0 in the final at Laugardalsvöllur.





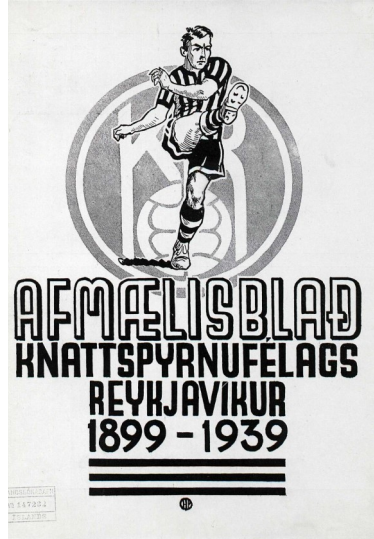

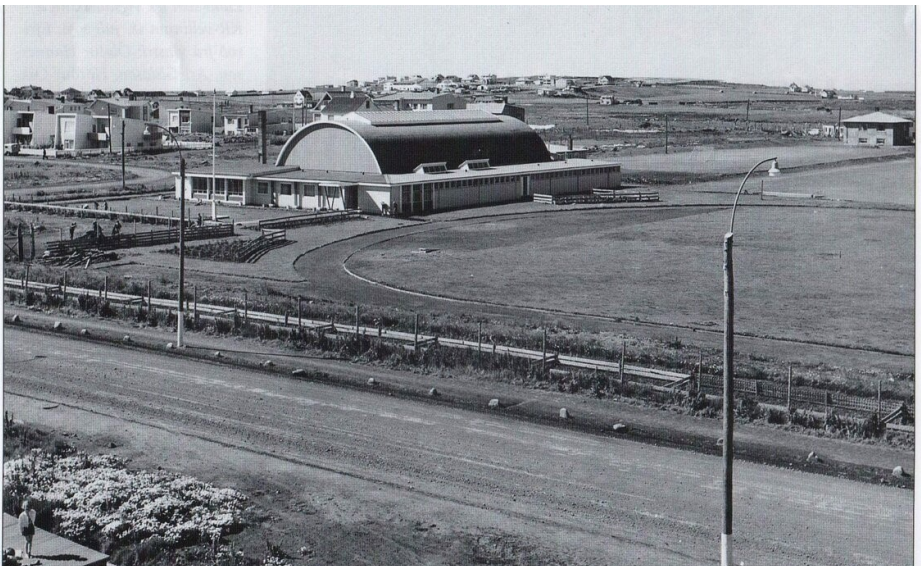

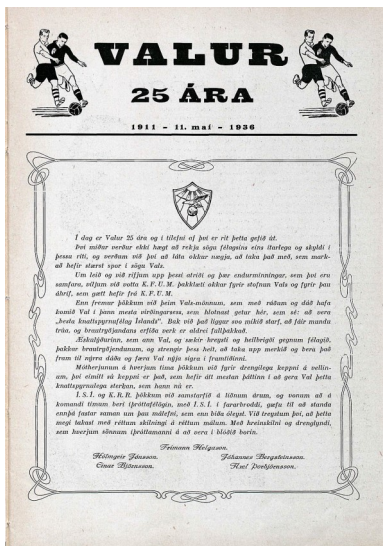

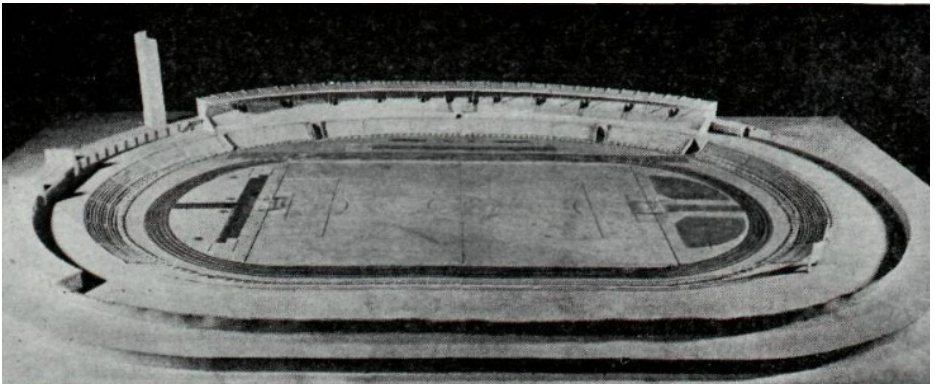

Fótboltaspilið (The football-card game) came out in 1944-45, with pictures of footballers from the big four Reykjavik teams, followed by a complicated set of rules. Today those cards are valuable for collectors.

The footballers of Reykjavik used every opportunity to play foreign opponents, e.g. sailors in harbour on a day-off. This picture shows a mixed team of footballers from KR and Fram in 1913 who played against a visiting group of Danish boy-scouts. OVERVIEW

On 30th October 2020, the dust finally settled on the most turbulent year in the history of Icelandic football; deep within the bowels of the National Stadium, after numerous disruptions to the 2020 season, a decision was made by the KSI Board to terminate the remaining league games and cup competition, as Covid-19 cases spiralled out of control across the country. In my opinion, this was the correct decision, however, many clubs would disagree as they were chasing promotion or fighting relegation battles.

To compound the misery of a dismal stop-start season, Iceland faced an acid test play-off against Hungary in Budapest: the Hungarians shellshocked the Icelanders by snatching victory, with two late goals, to earn a money-spinning berth at the European Championships. The financial implications of this defeat will be felt for years to come, especially after their previous success of reaching the last two major tournaments. The KSI invest huge amounts of windfall money, earned from these tournaments, back into the domestic game; clubs depend on this financial funding, and having lost vast amounts of revenue during the pandemic, it makes a bleak outlook for the future of Icelandic football. It will also have a monumental impact on how clubs operate their daily business over the coming years.

The on-going global situation is also going to have a detrimental effect on the transfer market in Iceland, where clubs rely on transfer sales. Over the past decade, Iceland has been at the forefront of selling their best youth talent to clubs across Europe, it is inevitable that these sales will start to dry up as football academies resort to developing their own homegrown players to control costs and budgets. For several years, Icelandic clubs have been paying over inflated wages to players - it was completely unsustainable in normal times never mind the current climate! Lesser leagues around Europe are starting to agree on salary caps - this must be seriously considered. Players need to take a considerable cut in wages, or clubs will have to resort to going back to amateur status with maybe having only 4 or 5 players being paid a salary. Sponsorship plays a huge part too, as with all sports in the country, but even more so with football - there are 9 teams alone, based in the capital area, with many more situated in and around the Reykjavik confines, too many clubs are all trying to chase the same sponsorship deals, however, companies will be looking at scaling back the amount of money they lay out. Not since the economic crash, in 2008, has Icelandic football been in such a precarious position. Teams in the rural areas of the country, that are highly dependent on foreign players, will have to make some tough decisions over the winter period.

It is unimaginable to think that in 2018, at the World Cup, Iceland were dining at the top table, with the footballing elite, and now the domestic leagues face financial meltdown. Covid-19, which has scarred the footballing landscape, has been a fundamental factor, but it also highlights that clubs must put more emphasis into their responsibilities. Mismanagement has also played a part: clubs made significant investments in players (wages), aiming to reap the rewards by finishing in the top 3 league positions and gain an automatic European spot for UEFA prize money. Currently, Iceland have 4 representatives playing in European competition, however, there is the unenviable scenario that Iceland only receive 3 automatic European spots in 2022, if they continue to slide down the European rankings, meaning even less generated money for clubs to compete for.

The last vestige of the Iceland squad has left a rich footballing legacy that the next generation of youngsters have got to embrace. There are a few promising players making the break-through at U21 level, the U19 group qualified for the European Elite group stage - the future is bright. There are, however, a few concerns that the youth development concept, within younger age groups, needs an overhaul. With less money readily available, there will be fewer coaching staff and the long-term future of Icelandic football is at stake, a pragmatic approach must be taken immediately and spearheaded by the KSI.

There are plenty of gifted coaches, businessmen and marketing staff who will steer Icelandic football out of the black days, which shroud the country at this moment in time, and navigate the transition into calmer waters. Icelandic fans, domestically and nationally, will have to put their belief into the process, which could take a few years to materialise - there is no quick fix. The national team have started the rebuilding process, and I am confident that fans will be watching Iceland compete at major tournaments again in the coming years.

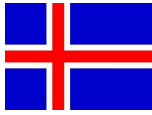
